

A MESSAGE FROM DR. MATTHEWS

My father graduated from Fairland High School in Fairland, Oklahoma. Not many have heard of Fairland High School. And for good reason.

My father's graduating class had 14 students.

It provided him a sense of community and it prepared him for the next step in his life. Every summer when I was young, we would visit Fairland and he would proudly show me around the high school. And, as a young boy, I loved that school.

What that community did for my father, Rockford does for its students. The school district provides both community and opportunity.

But building a community and providing opportunities require resources of time, effort, and money.

We don't often talk about the money it takes to run school districts. We instead focus on our children and our students because we want them to feel part of something bigger than themselves and we recognize that our children are worth the cost. But the truth is, high quality schools that create that community and offer a wide variety of opportunities in outstanding facilities take money to make it all work.

This November, our Rockford voters will have the opportunity to go to the polls to vote on a key piece of our district's financial balance sheet. In order for our balance sheet to remain healthy, our district is asking voters to renew our current bond millage rate.

Renewing the bond millage rate at 7 mills will allow our district to continue maintaining and improving our facilities, our technology, and our buses. This relieves the district of having to support these projects through our general fund.

The state of Michigan supports the basic education of our students. It provides a per pupil foundation for each student in the district. 80% of the funding that we get from the state goes to people – teachers, bus drivers, custodians, administrative assistants, paraprofessionals, and administrators. That leaves 20% for supplies – gas for the buses, utilities for the buildings, paper for the copiers, and so on.

The state of Michigan does not allow school districts to raise revenue for the general fund.

What the state of Michigan does allow is for school districts to raise money for facilities. In Rockford, we have a strong record of supporting our facilities, technology, and buses through millages. That support has allowed us to ensure that the general fund remains focused on supporting our people and our millages support our buildings, technology, and buses.

In 2018, the millage rate was 8.5 mills. In 2019 that was reduced to 7 mills. We are now asking for support to continue that millage rate at 7 mills. In doing so we will generate \$230 million dollars over the next ten years to support a wide variety of projects in our district. Those projects include:

- · Air conditioning for all remaining buildings
 - Primarily the 6 elementary buildings and our early childhood center
- Gyms for the four elementary buildings that do not have a separate gym
- Electronic door locks for all interior classroom doors
- Renovating and updating the high school performing arts center
- Building career and technical education facilities, in collaboration with our community
- Building an indoor turf facility
- Adding a new, larger video production studio and a new graphic arts classroom
- Adding a Ram Store retail space run by our students

The renewal of this bond will continue a strong tradition here in Rockford and do what Fairland, Oklahoma did for my father: build a community and create opportunities.

SCHOOL CLOSING INFORMATION

SCHOOL CLOSINGS/DELAYS

The decision to close or delay school can be a tricky one. As a Michigan resident, you know how fickle our weather is. Just as weather systems can appear without warning, there are times when weather systems predicted to appear do not. Please keep in mind that a forecast is a prediction. Even skilled meteorologists will agree that not all watches, warnings, and advisories materialize as predicted.

School personnel carefully monitor weather forecasts and road conditions. The Rockford Public Schools district spans approximately 97 square miles. Therefore, weather and road conditions can be significantly different within our school district. Ultimately, the decision to close or delay school is made by the Superintendent of Schools, with every effort to make a decision by 5:30am.

In summary, weather is unpredictable and district staff does their best to make reasonable and practical decisions with the safety of students as their top priority. In addition, please keep in mind that weather conditions can rapidly improve or decline from the time a decision is made in the early hours of the morning to the time school is scheduled to start. If at any time you feel it is unsafe to send your child(ren) to school due to the weather or road conditions, you are encouraged to exercise your right to keep them home with an excused absence.

EARLY DISMISSALS

Once students are in school, it is only in extreme cases the district would dismiss early due to weather, mainly due to the fact that many of our younger students could potentially go home to an empty house. However, in the rare case of an early dismissal, this will be posted on TV and the district website, and parents will be notified via the district's automated School Messenger system and/or the school phone tree.

Occasionally when road conditions deteriorate during the day, a decision is made to dismiss students up to one-half hour early to allow buses additional travel time so students arrive home at their regularly scheduled time. Edgerton Trails Welcomes Inaugural Outdoor Education Class

The start of the 25-26 school year brought with it the first class of Outdoor Learners. 25 4th graders, with Jodi Noakes as their classroom teacher, are taking their learning outside. The campus of Edgerton Trails Elementary has 26 acres of land that includes two ponds, a dock, pavilion, maple grove, hammock garden, fire pit, and walking trails. This inaugural group will move to 5th grade for the 26/27 school year and a new group of 4th graders will join the program.

Funding proposals on the November 4, 2025 ballot

KENT ISD ENHANCEMENT MILLAGE



The proposed millage rate is 0.9, the same millage rate voters approved in 2017.



If approved, this proposal generates approximately \$35.6 million-\$357 per student. That is approximately \$2,688,778 for Rockford Public Schools annually.



Since 2017, the taxpayer-approved enhancement millage has been used by Rockford Public Schools to: expand STEAM opportunities for grades K-5, increase counseling support, and reduce elementary class sizes.

RPS BOND PROPOSAL



This proposal would authorize the district to sell \$230 million dollars of bonds to finance capital projects in the district. The approval of the ballot measure would keep the current millage rate at 7 mills – a zero mill increase over the current debt millage.



Voter-approved bond funds can be spent on projects that are generally described in the proposal, such as new construction, additions, remodeling, site improvements, athletic facilities, playgrounds, buses, instructional technology, furnishings, equipment, and other capital needs.



This bond proposal furthers Ram XII, the district's strategic plan, focusing on the pillars: Building for the Future and Advancing Excellence.

HOW THESE DIFFERENT FUNDS ARE USED:

Regional enhancement millage: provides funding directly to our general fund that pays for day-to-day operations and educational programming, staff and supplies.

Bonds: provide funding for construction and acquisition of capital projects.

2025 RPS BOND PROPOSAL

The 2025 RPS bond proposal furthers RAMS XII, our strategic plan, and focuses on the pillars: Building for the Future and Advancing Excellence.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Why a bond proposal now?

- In 2019, voters approved a bond proposal for the construction of Edgerton Trails Elementary, created extended learning areas at our elementary schools, and addressed many aging building systems and sites. We have a large school district, with over 14 school buildings, which all have various building ages. Across those schools, many infrastructure systems have outlived their expected useful lives, and the District plans to replace them on a rolling basis.
- There are opportunities to fund facilities to enhance educational programming – early childhood education program expansion, Career Technical Education (CTE), to name a few.
- When the Board of Education recognized the opportunity to make improvements to the schools that would require an estimated zero mill net increase over the 2025 levy, the District sought input from the community to prioritize potential projects, further meeting the goals of RAMS XII, our Strategic Plan, and continue executing the facilities master plan for improving the facilities over the next several years.

By voting in November, we can start projects in the summer of 2026. Waiting until May 2026 would cause us to miss the summer 2026 construction season. The first series would be focused on air conditioning and elementary school gyms.

Wasn't elementary air conditioning already part of the 2019 proposal?

No. The 2019 proposal identified "mechanical" upgrades. Those upgrades have been and are being completed. They include the boiler at the high school and the boiler at Valley View.

Didn't the 2019 proposal identify playground replacement would happen?

Funding for the playground surfacing was included in the 2019 Proposal. Playground equipment is included in the 2025 Bond Proposal. We intend to use proceeds from both the 2019 Proposal and the 2025 Bond Proposal to replace the playground equipment with surfacing at the same time.

Can't the district use general funds to support building upgrades?

Legally, the answer is yes, but the reality is that Michigan school funding does not provide the financial resources needed for the general fund to pay for building upgrades. At Rockford Public Schools, currently 80% of the general fund goes to fund wages and benefits and 20% of the general fund goes towards the rest of the everyday operations (supplies, utilities, fuel for buses, etc). A school district's operating revenues are limited to the state established foundation allowance. Using general fund resources towards capital projects reduces the resources to compensate teachers and support classrooms.

Can't we expand the sinking fund?

Sinking funds are voter-approved millages that generate revenue over time. While districts can legally use sinking funds for construction and technology, sinking funds are not generally used to fund large projects because sinking fund revenues are generated over time and do not generate the amount of revenue needed. The sinking fund in Rockford is currently .4662 mills and it generates just over one million dollars a year. Voters would need to approve an increase in the sinking fund millage in order to expand the sinking fund. Expanding the sinking fund to the 3 mills legal limit would generate approximately \$6-9 million dollars a year.. While sinking funds can be part of the construction and upkeep (or repair) of school district buildings, the RPS sinking fund does not generate the revenue needed for big projects. For example, our elementary air conditioning project is estimated to cost between \$35-\$40 million dollars. If the district were to ask and voters were to approve a 3 mill sinking fund, at an estimated \$6-9 million dollars generated per year, it would take 4-5 years to generate the funds needed to complete the air conditioning project. No revenue would be available for other needed projects or repairs since all revenue would be saved for the large project. Since the sinking fund was approved by voters in 2019, the sinking fund has paid for the following projects:

- 2021 East Rockford Middle paving
- 2021 East Rockford Middle flooring
- 2024 East Rockford Middle elevator repair
- 2024 Valley View paying
- 2024 Roguewood asbestos abatement.

What is the plan for the bond proceeds?

What is the plan for the bond proceeds? The \$230M is planned to be spent on the priorities that have been identified in our pillars: Building the Future and Advancing Excellence. We anticipate the \$230M bond will be issued in three series as follows:

- 2026: \$40,000,000
- 2028: \$110,000,000
- 2032: \$80,000,000

The first series is smaller because there will be an overlap with the third series of bonds authorized in 2019.

Sensory Room Benefits Elementary Students

At school, every child's brain is working hard to take in information, focus, and learn. For some students, their bodies and minds need an extra step before they are ready to succeed in the classroom. That's where a sensory room makes a big difference, and the new space at Cannonsburg Elementary is helping students!

A sensory room is a calm, supportive space designed with tools, textures, lights. and movement options that help children regulate their emotions and energy. This isn't just for students with specific needs – every child can benefit from moments of sensory support. What makes a sensory room so valuable is the proactive approach it offers. Instead of waiting until a student is overwhelmed, distracted, or upset, teachers and staff can guide students into the sensory room before challenges arise. This gives them a chance to refocus, reset, and prepare their bodies and minds for learning.

Compare this with a reactive approach, which only steps in after a child is already struggling – whether through behaviors, frustration, or shutdowns. Reactive support helps, but it usually takes longer for a student to return to learning. Proactive support through the sensory room equips children with tools and experiences that help prevent those difficulties in the first place.

The result? Students spend more time engaged, classrooms are calmer, and children learn valuable self-regulation strategies that benefit them well beyond school. By investing in proactive resources like a sensory room, we're not just responding to student needs - we're preparing every child for a stronger, more successful learning journey.
